

What is Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP)?

Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) is a calculation run at the end of every trimester to determine if you are successfully meeting minimum standards in your coursework. These requirements include: Grade Point Average (GPA), Course Completion Rate (CCR), and Maximum Time Frame (MTF).

To meet SAP requirements at the end of every trimester:

Undergraduate Students must maintain:

- A cumulative GPA of at least **2.00**
- A minimum course completion rate (CR) of **66.66%** of all courses attempted. We calculate GPA using this [grading scale](#).
- The Maximum Time Frame (MTF) for undergraduate programs is 180 credit hours, or **150%** the normal duration of the program as measured in credit hours.

Graduate Students must maintain:

- A cumulative GPA of at least **3.00**
- A minimum course completion rate (CR) of **66.66%** of all courses attempted
- The Maximum Time Frame (MTF) for graduate programs is **150%** the normal duration of the program as measured in credit hours. For example:
 - For programs with 36 credit hours required, MTF is 54 credits.
 - For programs with 39 credit hours required, MTF is 58 credits.
 - For programs with 30 credits hours required, MTF is 45 credit hours.

If you fail to meet SAP standards at the end of a trimester, you will enter [SAP Warning](#) status and will have 1 trimester to return to good standing. Those who fail to meet SAP standards after the SAP Warning trimester will then enter [SAP Probation](#).
